Orchid Basics

We will continue our series of **Orchid Basics**, short focused programs on a wide range of orchid cultural topics. This month, Ben Johnson will present a program about watering your orchids.

Tom Mirenda

Speaker: Tom Mirenda, "Partners in the Orchid Garden Conservation Network (OGCN)"

Our speaker will be Tom Mirenda and he will present a program about the OGCN. Orchid Gardens are a worldwide trend and an important tool in the preservation of orchid species in the age of Climate change.....come explore such gardens in Costa Rica, Panama, Colombia, Peru, China, Southeast Asia and help us preserve orchids for future generations with this innovative idea.

Tom Mirenda has been cultivating plants since his early childhood and lives to create beauty

with plants in botanic Garden settings for more than half of his adult life. Originally trained as a Marine Biologist, Tom moved to Hawaii in his early 20s to pursue a MB career and worked on the Trophic relationships of denizens of Coral reefs in the Northwest Hawaiian Islands (Midway and French Frigate Shoals). There he realized he was better suited to Horticultural pursuits and took positions at New York Botanical Garden, Brooklyn Botanical Garden and at the Incredible Greentree Estate in Long Island where he cared for a first class Orchid collection. During this time, Tom also was the floor manager of the legendary New York International Orchid Show. Eventually Tom accepted the Orchid Collection Specialist position at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington DC where he cultivated and curated a huge diverse orchid collection for the past 17 years. The collection was used to create massive 4 to 5 month long educational orchid exhibits displayed to literally millions of visitors each year.

For the past 14 years Tom has contributed 2 monthly columns for the ORCHIDS magazine, the Bulletin of the American Orchid Society, and has developed an international following, as a writer, speaker and advocate for orchid conservation around the world. Last year Tom co- authored The Book of Orchids with Two scientists from Kew and has done speaking tours in

the British isles for the last three summers. Presented at the last 3 world Orchid conferences

and several IOCC and AOCs on Conservation topics. Tom was a founding member of the North American Orchid Conservation Center and continues his support of orchids conservation there, and around the world.

Last fall, Tom took a major gamble and left the security of his job with the Smithsonian to take a leadership position at the Hawaii Tropical Botanical Garden, an exceptionally beautiful

jewel on the lush Hamakua coast just north of Hilo on the Big Island (aka the Orchid Island!).

What Tom found there was an Orchid Paradise where myriad spectacular orchids of all types, both lowland and montane species and hybrids seem to thrive, simply planted in the trees, placing them thoughtfully in the landscape. Ultimately, he believes that the concept of growing orchids in Garden settings, to be a viable model world-wide for orchid conservation and encourages the ex-situ cultivation of orchids by diverse stakeholders in the orchid community and that it is only with the cooperation of Botanical Garden Professionals, Commercial Growers, academia and committed orchid collectors and backyard growers, that orchids will survive the vicissitudes of climate change.

YOUR ORCHIDS Are Needed

Your orchids are needed to help populate our 880-square foot garden "A Quiet Place" at the NW Flower & Garden Festival.

The orchids are needed on **Sunday, February 23rd** at the Washington State Convention Center in downtown Seattle. Someone will be at our garden from Noon until 11:00 pm. But we ask that you deliver your orchids **before 5:00 pm** if



possible. Or contact me (Joff Morgan) beforehand to arrange a later time. My contact details are in your Roster.

Delivering Orchids to our Garden:

The Convention Center runs a hand-carried freight elevator within the 8th Avenue Parking Garage. Parking is FREE if you are in and out within ONE HOUR and you get your ticket validated with the Freight Elevator attendant. The Freight Elevator runs that day until 7:00 pm.

NOTE: Vehicle height limit is 6'-5", no full size vans or trailers. If you go over the one hour your parking fee is calculated on the entire time you were parked.

Click "WSCC South HCF.PDF" for a PDF map with instructions on how to get there.

- Get your parking ticket validated with the Freight Elevator attendant
- Affix the brightly-colored "Work Pass," given by the attendant, to your clothing
- If you need a cart to transport your plants, check with the attendant for that
- Take the Freight Elevator to the 4th Floor
- Head straight into the Convention Center
- Walk up the aisle marked "500-600" to reach our garden
- You may also look for the huge floor-to-ceiling columns, we are just beyond the second column from the right, in the middle of the Show floor.
- Drop your plants off on one of the tables or multi-shelf carts around our garden
- Take the cart back to the Hand-Carried Freight elevator, if you checked one out
- and head on out of the parking garage. Thank you for coming!

Make sure that:

- Each plant pot and mount has your name affixed on it with blue painters tape
- Your name is affixed to any boxes or containers (if you want those back) used to transport your plants
- A printed list of each plant is included with your name and contact information
- Please indicate your wishes for your plants after the Show's end:
 - * Will you be picking up the plants on Sunday, March 1 after 6 pm? Your "Work Pass" sticker will work then too
 - * Or do they go home with someone setting up the Mt Baker Show on Friday, March 6?

February: BEGINNERS START HERE Basic Orchid Care Tips for Successfully Growing and Flowering Plants By Ron McHatton, PhD

KNOWING WHICH ORCHID YOU ARE trying to grow is your key to its cultural requirements. Orchids, like all plants, need a balance of light, air, water and food to grow and flower well. Let's examine each of these elements.

<u>LIGHT</u> Without enough light, orchids may produce lush-looking growths but no flowers. Not giving orchids enough light is the most common reason for failure to bloom. The old notion of orchids growing in dark jungles still persists and it couldn't be further from the truth. In reality, many have developed as epiphytes to take advantage of brighter light available in the upper forest canopy.

Provide orchids with as much light as they will take without burning. This means that the foliage should not be a lush, dark green. Orchids grown under sufficient light will have lighter, somewhat yellow-green foliage and strong upright growths.

<u>AIR</u> Orchid roots, and eventually the entire plant, will die if they do not receive air. This is the reason that, with the exception of a few terrestrial varieties, they do not grow in soil. Orchid potting media should be open, with exceptionally good drainage, yet capable of holding sufficient moisture to support the plant's needs. Orchid plants are also intolerant of a stale, stagnant environment. You should strive for a buoyant atmosphere and gentle air movement must be provided at all times. For orchids grown in the home, this can be provided by an overhead paddle fan set on its lowest setting or a portable oscillating fan directed away from the plants.

<u>WATER</u> Without question, more orchids are killed by incorrect watering than by any other reason. Proper watering consists of two separate components: quantity and frequency. Orchids should be watered just as they dry out. There's unfortunately no magic formula;

i.e., water a plant in a 6- inch (15-cm) pot every seven days and you'll be trouble free. This is because your growing area is different from anyone else's. Humidity, air movement, potting medium (type and age) and light levels all play a role.

There are several ways to determine when a potted orchid is almost dry: 1) The surface of the potting mix will appear dry. 2) Dry pots will feel lighter. 3) Clay pots feel dry. 4) A wooden stake or skewer inserted into the potting mix will come out almost dry. If in doubt, a finger inserted into the potting mix is perhaps the best tool to determine the moisture content of the potting mix. It will cause no harm to the plant.

When orchids are watered, they should be watered copiously. Water should be provided until it runs freely from the drainage holes. Not only does this soak the potting medium but it also flushes salts that naturally accumulate. At a minimum, try to thoroughly water plants at least once a month.

Watering frequency can be controlled by the choice of pot. For those who really like to water their plants or live in humid, rainy areas, clay pots, especially slotted pots are a good choice. Growers in drier climates or those who tend not to water often enough might want to use plastic pots to hold moisture longer.

<u>FERTILIZER</u> Orchids will grow and flower, given that their other requirements are met, for fairly long periods without fertilizer but you'll get better results with some level of fertilizing. Typically, plants are fertilized once a week during the summer and every two weeks in the autumn and winter. Regardless of the fertilizer that you choose to use, most experienced growers use no more than half the label- recommended strength. It's best to water first to wet the potting medium before you fertilize.

Fertilizers used on orchids should contain little or no urea. This is because soil organisms must first convert the nitrogen in urea to a form useable by plants, and because orchids do not grow in soil, this conversion does not occur efficiently. The old conventional wisdom used to be that orchids grown in bark mixes needed to be fertilized with formulations high in nitrogen, i.e., 30-10-10. We now understand that these high-nitrogen fertilizers aren't necessary. For a more detailed discussion of fertilizer and its dependence on water quality, see the June 2003 and February 2008 issues of Orchids magazine or view copies of pertinent articles on line at the Society's Web site (www.aos.org).

<u>OBSERVATION</u> Most experienced growers will agree that observation is the most important key to growing orchids well. Examining your plants on a regular basis will allow you to adjust and correct any problems before they become severe.
